When life became more stable at home, she re-entered the school system, but really struggled getting back into the rhythm of homework and regularly attending classes.

Beth's school was able to connect her to an AmeriCorps Student Success member.

This AmeriCorps member was able to work with Beth one-on-one to overcome her unique challenges. By the end of the year Beth was

passing ALL of her classes!

Hannah is a single parent who works unreliable and unpredictable hours at a manufacturing company. Her unconventional schedule made it difficult to secure childcare. Also, she often could not access the food pantry during operating hours and couldn't afford to buy groceries.

Searching for support, Hannah dialed 211. Immediately, 211 signed Hannah up for the Last Mile Delivery program, which sent a food box to her door weekly. Additionally, 211 connected Hannah to resources for childcare and after-school programs.

With 211's direction, Hannah was able to secure some stability in

her life and ensure her family always had sustenance.

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When the Welcome Baby started visiting with Raylene, this single mom was living with her parents. She had one bedroom for herself and her three children.

Throughout 4 years of Home Visits, the Welcome Baby Program supported and applauded her progress as she got a job at a storage facility and moved into a spacious two bedroom apartment.

She was so good at caring for her children and making sure they had everything they needed. They loved the visits and the learning kits.
